## GENEALOGY AND THE INTERNET, MY EXPERIENCES

The "Information Super Highway" provides many sources of information for the genealogist with a computer. There are mailing lists, news groups, Bulletin Boards, archives, and discussion groups via online services such as CompuServe, America Online, Prodigy, etc. Electronic access to library catalogs can also be helpful when the books can then be borrowed through Inter-Library Loan.

CompuServe has a genealogical forum called Roots. On it you can chat with other people interested in genealogy. There are also files you can download to your computer: files about people's research interests, genealogies, and various bits of information. I believe other online services have something similar.

I subscribe to an electronic mailing list called ROOTS-L. A mailing list works by distributing to all the subscribers every electronic mail message that is sent to the list. It can be accessed by anyone who has e-mail capability. (I have a direct Internet connection through the University where I work, but most of the online services, such as CompuServe, also offer e-mail.) The mail items seem to be mainly of three types: 1) particular queries; 2) genealogical software questions; and 3) asking for information from a particular source. In the last category, I asked the list if anyone would look up a WEINBECK marriage record for me in the Massachusetts state archives. Someone wrote back, and not only looked up that record, but also some death records. One of the most helpful things about this mailing list is the Roots-L Surname List. People send lists of the surnames on which they are working, together with range of dates and locations, to a central repository. (Example: BARTLETT 1660-now Newton, MA>Bethel,ME>Lowell,MA>CT.) Each month any new additions to this surname list are posted to ROOTS-L and also downloaded to CompuServe, among other places. This is a great way to find other people researching the same families. Because people from all over the world subscribe to this list, one can find out where to write for vital records in other countries, addresses of Genealogical Societies, helpful hints on using the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, and more.

## INTERNET (cont.)

News groups are the Internet version of discussion groups. Some genealogically related news groups are soc.genealogy.computing( for discussion of computers and genealogy), soc. genealogy.surnames (for sharing data on various surnames of interest)soc.genealogy.fr( for discussion of genealogy in France)etc. Some online services provide news groups readers.

There are many genealogy related bulletin boards all over the country. Many are run out of a person's home and are just discussion groups. As was mentioned by one of your speakers last fall, the Maine State Archives have a bulletin board. On it they explain what information is available at the State Archives.

FTP sites are locations on the Internet where genealogical information is stored and can be downloaded by the File Transfer Protocol (FTP). Most online services do not yet provide FTP although it is planned for the future. DELPHI provides it now. Not much primary source data is available online yet for searching. One exception is that a 2% sample of the 1851 UK Census is available for downloading.

A relatively new, but burgeoning field for genealogy is the World Wide Web, which is a

series of linked documents. It can be accessed by a browser, such as Mosaic, or Netscape or Lynx. Again, most of the major on-line services do not offer this yet, but some smaller companies are jumping in. (Read ads in the back of computing magazines for possibilities). Several of the U.S. Government agencies such as the National Archives, the Census Bureau, and the Library of Congress, have created their own "home pages", which tell what information they provide.

I have found most people I've corresponded with electronically to be incredibly helpful. One man originally wrote me because my name was listed on some surnames from Washington County, ME, which were also in his wife's family. He was from Bristol, RI, where some of my father's ancestors lived, and loaned me a book by mail on Bristol's early settlers, which was a great help to me and gave me several new lines. This man also spent time during his vacation in the Courthouse and historical society in Machias, ME copying some information for me, photographed some tombstones, and has been superbly helpful. Another correspondent sent me copies of the Adjutant General's report on a civil war regiment which included details about the battle in which one of my husband's ancestors died.

For those who missed our first meeting,we plan to provide support for our Society on computer projects, such as FAMILY SEARCH, and to assist each other in selecting computer hardware and most particularly in the selection of Genealogical software (including CDs) and keeping members up to date on Genealogical data available in "Cyberspace"! FAMILY SEARCH, which I hope all of you have now tried,has been running in the Library for 2 months & is by all accounts a great success; the Library who provided the magnificent Compaq 486 DX (with a quad CD drive) are happy with the program which is their most popular work station.The program is so user friendly that the team of MGS support volunteers,that we put together has ended up like the Maytag repair man!Please be generous though with your contribution to help pay for the software, which we donated to the Library (as a 100th birthday present).

We got a nice letter from Steve Kyner,who spoke at our last meeting & he put a piece about MGS's aquisition of FAMILY SEARCH in the New England COMPUTER Genealogist which he edits.

Steve has also started up the GENSUP forum on Compuserve with Dick Eastman who runs the primary Genealogical Forum on Compuserve which you can access with a GO ROOTS command.

These forums have Libraries loaded with Genealogical goodies which are easy to download if you have a modem(preferably running at 14,4) and the Compuserve Communication package WINCIM (for Windows).

GO ROOTS has many of the LDS publications which can be downloaded & GO GENSUP,which is fairly new, has support for The MASTER GENEALOGIST which shows great promise as the latest all bells & whistles software for home genealogy.

I downloaded the free Demo version from GENSUP this week & have sent for the \$10 working model which allows one to try out the program on some data to see how it goes (They refund \$10 if you buy the full program (\$99). Pete Kenyon has the full program loaded & says their support is excellent,Dave Mordy suggests that we wait for version 1.02 which is promised in two weeks time! Call 1-800-982-2103 for info.

And finally another exciting moment in cyberspace this week, PRODIGY beat their peers in providing easy access to navigation of WORLD WIDE WEB. This brings the incredible ability to scan through a hypertext document which has under-lined words, which when clicked by the mouse,send the system scurrying off around the World to find the related document in some remote computer & load it into your machine where it come up on screen & can be printed out if necessary.I already downloaded a bunch of useful Canadian search data from the Genealogy section being run by EVERTONS in the Hobbies Area!

**OLD SCITUATE CEMETERY  
FOUND AND CLEARED IN RI**

About fifty stones in an abandoned cemetery in Scituate, Rhode Island have been located and cleared of debris by James and Patricia Carr, a young couple who were building a house on the property nearby. Grave markers include the surnames of Ralph, Walton and Griswold and date back as far as 1809.

About 30 of the stones predate the Civil War. The Carrs hope to locate the descendants of those laid to rest in the 50-by-80 foot plot. "We just want them to know it's here so, maybe, they can help update the history and genealogy of the area," said James Carr.

The site was known as the Ralph Cemetery. Many of the grave markers are illegible. "But some of them have the surnames of Ralph and Walton, along with the most prominent name of Griswold," said Carr. "The quality of the headstones indicate they must have been well-to-do."

The Carrs say the cleanup of the old cemetery neighboring their property should be completed by Sunday, "and then we'll repair the pipe railing around the perimeter", said Carr.

John Sterling, coordinator of a 25 member volunteer group that has been recording old cemeteries statewide, said the Scituate site is one of

3,200 identified in Rhode Island, all but 200 of them abandoned. Sterling said, "This one is recorded, but not registered. The difference is that registration involves the state installing a small white sign with a number designating the location as a historic cemetery," assuming the owner gives permission. There are about 150 recorded cemeteries in Scituate where, in the 1930's Charles and Martha Benz compiled a private record of 130.

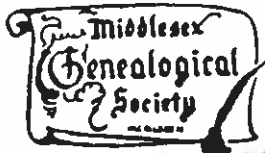
Besides our own collection and a Darien Library Collection (in the Business Reference Room), the Mezzanine, New Book Shelves, and even the Children's Room. All books have been inventoried and indexed and are included in this catalog.

The books are listed by

location. To aid in finding them, shelf numbers and library call numbers are used along with a map of the library showing each location. Updating of all locations will be done occasionally to record new books and return any misplaced books to their original shelves. Most of the books previously listed as missing were merely misplaced.

The two collections in the Business Reference Room have been updated from an inventory compiled in 1992 by Pat Flowers. Booklets and a diskette were supplied. Also included in the original booklets and added to the new catalog is a listing of genealogical books in the Darien Historical Society's Library.

Local history books belonging to the M.G.S., Darien Library and Darien Historical Society have been indexed and are included in this catalog.

Richard Britteridge - died at Plymouth Mass 31 Dec 1620, the first death after landing at Plymouth.

William Butten - died on the Mayflower at sea 16 Nov 1620.

Name not Known - maid servant of John Carver.

John Crackston - died at Plymouth between 11 Jan and 10 Apr 1621.

His son, John - died at Plymouth soon after 1 June 1627; apparently no known descendants.

Ely - returned to England at the expiration of his contract for one year.

Thomas English - died at Plymouth between 11 Jan and 10 Apr 1621; apparently no known descendants.

Moses Fletcher - died at Plymouth between 11 Jan and 10 Apr 1621; married 1st Maria Evans, who died before Nov 1613. Married 2nd at Leyden, 1613, Sarah (---) Dingby, widow of William. Known descendants proved.

Richard Gardiner - died in England or at sea between 1623 and 1651.

John Goodman - died at Plymouth before 1627.

William Holbeck - died at Plymouth early 1621, but after 11 Jan.

John Langmore - died at Plymouth early 1621, but after 11 Jan.

William Latham - died at Bahama Isles between 7 Nov 1645 and 6 Mar 1651.

Edward Leister - died in Virginia before 6 Mar 1651.

Edmund Margeson - died at Plymouth 18 Jan 1621. His wife died early in 1621, after 11 Jan.

Christopher Martin - died at Plymouth 18 Jan 1621. His wife died early in 1621, after 11 Jan.

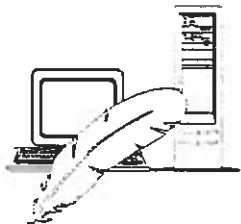
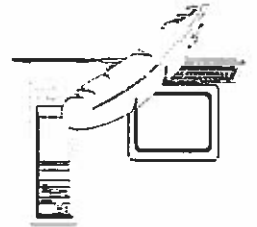
